Candidates tell District 6 voters their plans

The Extra wanted to give all 17 candidates running for District 6 supervisor an opportunity to speak directly to voters. We asked them for a photo and to answer the question: "If elected, what will you do for the Tenderloin?" Here are their answers, limited to 150 words, as we requested.



Brenton Holland

Having lived and worked in District 6 for five years, I understand the challenges that are presented to building owners, renters and visitors to District 6. I have managed a 29-story, mixed-use high-rise, a miniature city, for five years. This experience has enlightened me to the problems property owners face in the district and the city. The homeless sleeping and defecating on your property. Lack of or delay of city services, including police and or DPW in cleaning their portion of the problem. Seniors and disabled persons have difficulty in getting around San Francisco. Taxis, public transportation and the lack of everyday services or amenities plague the many seniors and disabled persons in District 6. All of the districts have a similar problem keeping the streets clean. It is not just one supervisor trying to get the job done. It will take a collaborating effort to clean the city of San Francisco. Treasure Island should be another community, like Hayes Valley, the Marina, Cole Valley or SOMA. New construction and realistic ideas are needed. It needn't be an amusement park.



Dennis Isner

As a community activist and former S.F. Youth Commissioner, I've seen this district's problems first hand. I am running because I want to end the corruption and backroom dealing that not plague City Hall. Beryl Magilavy

The Tenderloin is a diverse neighborhood that has been underserved by city services for too long. The residents of the Tenderloin deserve clean sidewalks, public restroom facilities adequate to the needs of the community, and sufficient beat police officers to vastly reduce the street prostitution and open drug dealing. The City should return to its responsibility, abandoned years ago, of cleaning the sidewalks. I would prioritize funding for building and, when necessary, staffing, public restroom facilities. And I would work closely with the Tenderloin Task Force to determine what policing level is necessary, then fight for that level within the budget process. While it is crucial that we preserve the Tenderloin's affordable housing, private owners of single-room-occupancy hotels should not profit from renting out rooms in unsafe, unclean buildings. They should bring their buildings up to code immediately, or sell them to the city, which could operate them affordably.



Jim Reid

I am a building contractor with good listening skills, common sense, and a great deal of compassion. I am a tenant and I want to see tens of thousands of long-term tenants own the housing that they live in. There are federal, state, and city agencies ready to help with this. If we moved 10,000 tenants into home ownership, we would bring 10,000 rental units onto the market and lower rents. See my housing at www.SFSupervisor.com. I stayed in our homeless shelters during my run for Mayor and would build a shelter system that provides for the needs of the 17 different categories of homeless people. Homelessness is a very complex problem and there is not one solution that will solve the problem. My 10x10 housing cubicle will give dignity and housing to able-bodied homeless people in exchange for adopting a city block.



Joan Roughgarden

I'm running to improve our neighborhoods and to affirm diversity. I'm a biologist and teach at Stanford University. I live in South Beach. My priorities for the Tenderloin are to stop drug dealing and clean the streets of human waste. I support police initiatives against drug pushers. I'll increase the number of officers walking the beat, and promise that arrests will be fully prosecuted. I will increase the city sanitation workers' efficiency by introducing better management methods. I emphasize education, especially incentives for our children to remain in school now, instead of waiting for a future payoff that never seems to arrive. I believe art is basic. I propose a waterfront plaza with a Statue of Diversity. It will be for the West Coast what the Statue of Liberty is to the East Coast, symbolizing San Francisco as home to all of us. I'd be honored to have your vote.



Carol Ruth Silver

During my years in political life, I have taken seriously the responsibility of "tikkun olam," the Hebrew phrase for the strong obligation to heal our world of its social ills: discrimination, poverty, homelessness, the lack of medical and mental health services, and the abuse of our environment. San Francisco, and particularly District 6, is a microcosm of these problems, and should be an example to the world of success in dealing with them. I am seeking election again to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors. I have never had any trouble asking for money for community causes, but asking for money for my candidacy is profoundly difficult. Marc Salomon

Marc, Green for Supervisor, proposes District Councils, elected by precinct, with voting power over city issues to empower Tenderloin residents on neighborhood issues like where to allocate police resources. We need massive campaign finance reform. District 6 is too diverse for one supervisor to effectively represent 40,000 voters and 70,000 residents. We can lead ourselves. Housing is beyond crisis, but without democracy and finance reform, single-issue crises won't get resolved. Evict housing profiteers, declare housing emergency, moratorium on evictions, end musical rooms, bring rental housing under the management of residents. Make streets safe, primarily for seniors and the disabled. Fix schools [for] future generations, adult education towards higher-wage tech work. Quality health care, like housing, is a right. Democratically run nonprofits, with a majority of their boards seating their client community, would have my ear and assistance. End the revolving door between nonprofit workers and city officials. No TNDCC sole-sourcing.



Hank Wilson

City of Love or City of Greed? The humanity of San Francisco is at stake after a record number of homeless died on our streets last year amidst our booming economy. The mayor abruptly closed the largest shelter and his planning commission recently approved the largest live-work development with NO affordable units. The housing crisis is getting worse. I care. I run to make a difference. My 18 years managing the Ambassador Hotel gave me first-hand experience dealing with the complex challenges of District 6. We can do better and differently. Priorities: strengthen renter protections; Yes on H and N; increase affordable housing; Yes on L to stop runaway greed-driven development; strengthen health care including in-home support for seniors and the disabled; substance abuse treatment upon request; more child care; reduce the mayor's power; restore responsive planning and balanced development that does not harm; increase shelter capacity.



Denise D'Anne

City services for the Tenderloin have been severely neglected. One thing I would do is streamline service programs under one agency. These programs, such as food stamps, housing services, substance abuse services and child care should be housed in one easily accessible building. I would negotiate for a partnership between banks and the existing credit union for smart cards for food stamps and no-cost check cashing. I would lobby for the establishment of Section 8 vouchers that are 120% of fair market rent. I would insist on funding for drug treatment on demand. I would fund services and provide options for sex workers who choose to leave their profession. I would help facilitate community safety measures. The above measures could be funded with an expansion of my resource recovery program that I established in the Department of Human Services. This program has the potential to save millions of dollars.



Joseph Blue

As your next supervisor from District 6, I am an independent, grass-roots candidate who will get things done. My priority when elected will be to represent the forgotten and overlooked citizens of the district. What you will have is an advocate who will work for the issues most concerning the Tenderloin such as crime, drug dealing and general quality of life issues.
